Looking after the health of you and your family is one of the most important investments you can make in your life. Maintaining a healthy lifestyle through regular exercise, balanced nutrition, and stress management not only helps prevent illness but also improves your overall quality of life.

Equally vital is taking advantage of the free NHS vaccination and screening opportunities outlined below.

### **Vaccinations**

Unfortunately, in 2025 there was an outbreak of measles in the UK and the severity of flu this winter has hit the news headlines. For some, these diseases can be a serious and life-threatening illness. To reduce the risk, we therefore urge those who are eligible to make sure they are vaccinated.

Whilst it is normally given as a childhood vaccine, the MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccine can be given at any age. Please speak to your GP practice about getting vaccinated if you did not have it as a child, you only had one dose or you're not sure if you've been fully vaccinated.

Adults are eligible for a free flu vaccine if aged 65 years or over; pregnant; living with certain long-term health conditions; a carer; living with someone with a weak immune system.

Additionally, children aged 2-16 years are offered a flu vaccine in the form of a quick and painless nasal spray. Importantly, this protects both the child and the risk of spreading to others.

The annual flu vaccination season runs until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2026. If you are eligible and have yet to be vaccinated, please contact your GP practice.

### **NHS Health Checks**

These are available every 5 years for patients aged 40 to 74 who do not have a pre-existing health condition.

It involves completion of a lifestyle questionnaire, together with measurements including height, weight, blood pressure, cholesterol. It can tell if you are at higher risk of getting health problems such as heart disease, diabetes, kidney disease, stroke and dementia.

### **Cancer Screening Programmes**

**Bowel** - A home testing kit is sent through the post every 2 years to everyone aged 50 – 74 years.

**Breast Cancer** - uses x-rays, called mammograms, to look for cancers that are too small to see or feel. You automatically get your first invitation between the ages of 50 and 53. You'll then be invited every 3 years until your 71<sup>st</sup> birthday.

**Cervical Screening** - a test to check the health of the cervix and help prevent cervical cancer. It is offered to women and people with a cervix aged 25 to 64.

These programmes are designed to detect potential health issues at an early stage, often before symptoms appear. Early detection greatly increases the chances of successful treatment and can even save lives.

At this time of resolutions, we urge you to take proactive steps to prioritise your health, protect your wellbeing and ensure a healthier future.

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## TOSTOCK PARISH COUNCIL 13<sup>th</sup> January 2026

The meeting was attended by 7 Parish Councillors and Suffolk County Councillor, Andy Mellen. Apologies had been received from Cllrs Bauly and Kearsley and also District Cllr Richardson.

This is a **summary** of the meeting. All papers are on the Parish Council section of the Tostock-pc.gov.uk website

The main topic for the meeting was the Finance Working Group report setting out proposals for TOSTOCK PARISH COUNCIL BUDGET 2026-2027

The Finance Working Group is made up of Cllr Julian Kearsley (Finance Councillor and Chair), Cllr Paul Callow, Cllr Andrew Sharkey and Cllr Jane Storey

The Group met on Monday 8 December and agreed recommendations for both the Council budget and precept requirement for 2026-2027.

The Group recommendations are based upon the information presented below:-

### **Expenditure**

**Personnel:** Costs adjusted to allow for potential rises from April 1 2026.

**Expenses:** Have decreased as payments are now majorly effected on-line, thereby saving postage/stationery costs each month.

**Grants:** The budget has been maintained against possible bids from village groups/bodies.

**Subscriptions, Insurance and Audit Fees:** Increased given expected rises.

**Bin Services:** The reduction this year is unlikely to be replicated - hence the proposed budget is the same as that for 2025-2026.

**Venue Hire:** A straightforward budget based on seven meetings at £15.00.

**Tree Audit:** The budget is to cover a review of village trees some of which it has been suggested may need some degree of maintenance for health and safety reasons.

**Website:** The budget is based on the cost of maintaining the website plus the separate cost of the Council e-mail facility.

**Data Protection:** The Information Commissioner's Office raised the annual fee in 2025 to £52.00 per annum so a further rise is very unlikely.

**Legal Fees:** The anticipated cost of The Leys and The Village Green being registered with the Land Registry.

**Chronicle** – the target is for a 16 page newsletter serving the village and, with advertising income, becoming self-financing. It has been agreed at previous meetings that village groups and organisations can publish free of charge, and with a limit on coverage, but commercial organisations should be charged at the published rates.

**Income** There is little scope to influence this apart from the precept. Bank interest has been good but that position can only be maintained as long as Community Infrastructure Levy funding remains unspent.

**General Reserve** Sections 32 and 43 of the Local Government Finance Act 1992 require local authorities to be mindful of reserves needed for meeting estimated future expenditure when fixing budget requirements. The General Reserve has no restrictions on use and is held primarily in case of unexpected events. All reserves should be reviewed and justified regularly (i.e. at least annually). The generally accepted recommendation with regard to the appropriate minimum level of a smaller authority's general reserve is that this should be maintained at between three and twelve months of net revenue expenditure.

## TOSTOCK PARISH COUNCIL (cont'd)

**Earmarked Reserves** These are simply funds set aside for specific purposes. The Finance Working Group opted to allocate £2,500.00 for an extra speed device and to retain the sum dedicated for highways works. For 2025-2026 £1,000.00 was set aside to start to prepare for the eventual replacement of the Council mower and a further £4,000.00 has been added given a potential end-of-year surplus in the current account. To plan for potential parish council elections in 2027, a reserve of £500.00 has been created.

**Precept Recommendation** The 2023-2024 precept was subject to a reduction by the previous Council. This which presented financial difficulties for the present Council which had to take the decision to promote a significant rise in the precept for 2024-2025. As a result of effective financial management by the Council in that year, there was no need to increase the precept again for 2025-2026. ***For 2026-2027, given the continued effective financial management of the Council and the financial pressures affecting residents, the Finance Working Group is recommending that the Parish Council Band D council tax should not be increased but remain unchanged at £53.38.***

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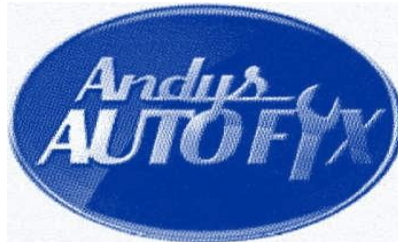
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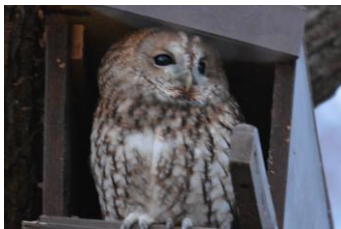
All of us could do with something extra special to lead us into 2026, so how about our own local Tawny Owls, there can't be anything more special than them. "Strix-aluco" with the killer instinct and exceptional hearing, silent wings and a wide-ranging diet, the Tawny Owl is a fear some predator.

Those of you that live in Church Road and New Road are more likely to hear it than see it. Now is the time for you to go outside in the evenings, you should be able to hear it in your plantation. We are now hearing them behind Wood Close.

In Winter its familiar (Twit Twoo) call is actually two calls – the (Kee-Wick), of the female, followed by the male response, (Tu-Woo). It has a varied diet, eating anything from bats, mice, moles, rabbits, rats, shrews and voles to amphibians and small birds such as blackbirds, sparrows, starlings and thrushes. In rural areas, its meals are largely made up of small mammals. In Urban areas small birds and rodents are likely to be taken.

When hunting, the Tawny Owl relies on its sight and hearing, and uses its talons only during the attack. Breeding takes place in late Winter to Spring which is now. Nests are made in holes in trees, old nests made by large birds such as corvids, nests made by Squirrels and nest boxes usually in woodland, but also in urban areas such as cemeteries and occasionally in large gardens with plenty of tree cover.

These photos I took at Fornham St Genevieve. A friend of mine asked me to make the box which I did and I even told him which tree and branch to hang the box. He didn't realise that the box had been occupied until 2 little owlets appeared at the front. I did this with the agreed condition that I could go any time to take photographs.

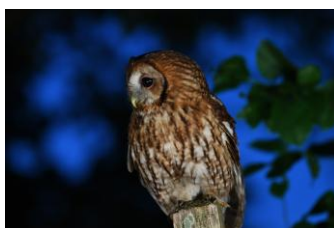


The female lays up to 3 large, white round eggs from late Winter to early Spring and incubates them for 28 days. The young stay in the nest for around 28 days after hatching, but still dependent on the parents for several weeks after, usually up to 3 months but occasionally longer. As few as 1 owlet per brood can make it to adulthood.

Given Amber status by the R.S.P.B, due to its continued moderate decline. It is a widespread breeding species in England, Scotland and Wales but not found in Ireland. Over much of Europe this is the most common and familiar Owl, its hooting call the-archetype of all Owl voices, though in fact rather unrepresentative.

The appeal of Owls lies in their humanoid expressions, with foreheads and eyes setting at the front of the broad flat face. Such features are actually adaptations for nocturnal hunting, the position of the eyes confides a wide field of binocular vision. Sensitive hearing is also vital, and Owls have relatively huge ears, their opening concealed just behind the facial disc of feathers surrounding the eyes.

We will leave it at that and show you some more of my photographs. I have been very fortunate indeed to have another good friend living in Cambridgeshire who breeds Tawny Owls in his large garden and has invited me over to take these photographs, apart from the first 2. Unfortunately it is a set up situation and I have had to pay for the privilege, but nevertheless it was absolutely worth the effort to photograph such a very special bird. Hope you enjoy it as much as I did.
